## Concord-Carlisle, Needham breeze in EsMass lacrosse

One shutout in topflight lacrosse competition is rare enough, but the Eastern Massachusetts High School tournament came within 1:15 of giving us two at Brandies yesterday.

Concord-Carlisle had dispatched defending state champion Newton North, 4-0, in the opener of a semifinal doubleheader and favored Needham was on its way to a similar victory in the nightcap, when Lincoln-Sudbury erupted

for a pair of quick goals in the last 1:15 to go down by a 4-2 score.

Thus, it will be Need-ham vs. Concord-Carlisle in tomorrow's Eastern Mass finale at Brandies (5:30 p.m.), with the winner meeting the Western Mass. champ at the same site Saturday at 2 p.m.

Needham (14-1) struck for two quickies in the first 1:18 — within 35 seconds of each other on the first two times downfield, in fact — when Rich Hawes and Evert Ellison scored against a seemingly confused Lincoln-Sudbury squad. That blitz put Lincoln-Sudbury into a hole from which it could never quite recover. The late burst was far too late and too little against the powerful Needham team.

Goalie Phil Corbett came up with 14 saves, many of them acrobatic, as Concord-Carlisle dominated Newton North. Peter Reed led an adequate attack with two goals, while John O'Connell and Mike Cloutman each contributed a goal.

Needham, which holds a recent 9-3 decision over Concord-Carlisle, has not lost to a high school opponent this season, its only setback coming at the hands of Tabor Academy.

### Needham lacrosse big shot

Here's one sport, at least with a frank coach — high school lacrosse.

"We choked away the first quarter," decided Lincoln-Sudbury coach Andy Oleski after his team had dropped a 4-2 decision to Needham in the night-cap of Eastern Mass Tournament semi-final double-header at Brandeis yesterday. "We had been playing our best lacrosse the last three or four games, and it seemed we were peaking."

In truth, it was a gruesome display. Favored (14-1) Needham appeared to score two goals just by its reputation. The Rockets took the game's opening face-off, waltzed downfield, and went ahead 1-0 on a goal by Rich Hawes after a mere 43 seconds of play.

Another faceoff, another Needham recovery, another trip downfield — and another goal, this one by Evert Ellison. They had played a total of 1:18, and L-S was trailing by a 2-0 score.

And those two goals proved to be the difference, as a late burst (two goals in the last 1:15 of the fourth period) prevented a shutout and enabled L-S

In the opener, Concord-Carlisle gathered together behind an awesome display by tiny goalie Phil Corbett to oust defending state champ Newton, 4-0. Neither team showed much in the first half ("Our guys weren't used to the heat," explained C-C mentor 'Jim McClellan. "We've played in three thunderstorms, but not

weather like this"), but Concord-Carlisle started getting untracked in the final 24 minutes to take an easy victory over Newton.

In Needham, C-C will meet the most talked-about team. "We've got great strength at midfield and we're in excellent condition," says Needham coach John Bamberry. "We beat Concord-Carlisle once before, but, from what I saw of their game

today, they handled th ball much better and thei running game was im proved."

# Needham, as usual, scores first, wins lacrosse title

There never was any doubt, really. Getting behind the Needham High lacrosse team is like begging for a submission hold.

So it was that the Eastern Mass. High School Tournament final at Brandeis's Gordon Field went the way of all but one Needham games this season. Needham scored first, Needham came up with the big goals when pressed a bit and Needham protected the lead in the stretch.

The result was a 5-2 victory over Concord-Carlisle to wrap up Needham's first Eastern Mass. crown. All that stands between the Rockets and their long-standing goal, to win the state title, is a game with Longmeadow High tomorrow at 2 p.m. at the same site.

Yesterday's was a defensive triumph. Goalie Bobby Carter was, of course, a standout. "He stopped a lot of one-on-one shots right in front of the net," beamed coach John Bamberry. "And our close defense blocked a lot of shots with their hustle."

Bamberry, who is also the Needham football coach, felt that the key point in the game came in the second period. Concord-Carlisle had just scored to make it, 3-1, and appeared to have the momentum. But Larry Mann wasted no time righting things, whipping a 15-footer from out front past game C-C goalie Phil Corbett.

The clincher came with just 38 seconds left to play in the half, when Roy Heffernan, a converted catcher playing his first year of lacrosse, made a beautiful dash downfield before passing off to Paul Martin, who rammed it home. That made it 5-1, and allowed Needham's defense to take charge in the final 24 minutes.

"Those two goals really took the sting out of them," Bamberry pointed out.

Saturday's state final game won't be the end of the lacrosse season, either. The East-West (prep and public schools, both) All Star game will be played at Springfield College at 2 p.m. Bamberry will be one of the coaches on the Eastern squad, which will include several of this area's best players.
