Lincoln-Sudbury storms into lacrosse final

A friend strode across the Tufts University field yesterday to shake the hand of Newton North lacrosse coach Tom DePeter.

"They can't take 19-0 away," he told DePeter as their eyes met.

"Maybe," DePeter said, bowing his head. "But I wanted this one."

A chance at four-time defending state champ Longmeadow, the state champion-ship and an undefeated season dissolved yesterday. Lincoln-Sudbury saw to that.

The Warriors (18-1) avenged their only loss of the season, ending Newton's 19-game streak, 9-6 to move into Saturday's finals (WNTN 1550, 2:30) against Longmeadow.

The Lancers blitzed Concord-Carlisle yesterday with seven straight second-half goals to erase a brief 7-6 Concord edge, 13-8.

But the state's two best teams, if you listened to DePeter and Lincoln-Sudbury

coach Andy Oleski, met yesterday at Tufts.

"We lost to a great team," said DePeter. "I think these are the two best teams in the state."

"I don't want to see a letdown," said Oleski, "but I think these are the two best. We're going to celebrate for the next 24 hours. Then it's yesterday's game. And this is another season."

No one knew that better than Oleski. His Warriors had dropped a grueling 5-3 decision to Newton in early May. Patiently, they waited for a second chance.

"I told the kids," said Oleski, "that not many times in life do you get a second chance. You never get a third chance."

The Warriors didn't need it. They scored the game's first three goals, and Newton never got even. The Tigers closed to 4-3 by halftime, but Steve Glover (58-23-81) answered with two unassisted goals, the second initiating a three-goal, 57-second spurt that changed the spots on the Tigers' 19-0 mark.

Next, Lincoln will have a chance to interrupt Longmeadow's string of four straight state titles. Concord-Carlisle tried yesterday at the Meadow, leading 7-6 early in the third period behind three Mark Danforth goals.

But the Lancers grabbed eight of nine second-half face-offs, and 11 of the last 12, to spark the seven-goal blitz that ended the Patriots' season.

"We had our opportunities," said Concord-Carlisle coach Jim McClellan.

Saturday at Tufts, Lincoln-Sudbury will have its chance.
