Concord-Carlisle

The talent never seems to stop coming at Concord-Carlisle, and this Spring should be no different for the Patriots who opened their season with a strong 11-3 non-division triumph over Bedford.

C-C posted a 17-3 overall record last year, with all three losses (two against Billerica and one Lincoln-Sudbury) coming by one goal margins.

Among the host of talented players that graduated from that squad were Justin Shay (Notre Dame), Mark DiTargiani (Wesleyan), goalie Dave Donadio (UPenn), Chris Painter (Dennison), Ben Esty (Stanford), Rob Granahan (Tufts) and Ethan Owen.

While veteran Coach Jim McClellan

certainly wasn't happy to see those players leave, he isn't wasting much time reminiscing.

"We have a lot of depth," he confirmed. "We actually have two separate varsity teams, and in a lot of our games the first group might not play much at all. We run five midfield units, and in the opener against Bedford we fielded 31 players and they all saw considerable time."

Among the talented returning attackmen are senior Quad-Capt. Mike Lyne and Paul Paglia, both of whom finished last season with better than 60 points, and junior Pete White.

The first midfield trio includes Quad-Capt. Steve Fay, senior Chris Mariano and senior Mike Robichaud. Fay's older brother Chris established a number of scoring records at the University of New Hampshire in recent years.

Tops on defense are senior Quad-Capt. Mike Spangler, junior Chris Wickwire and senior John Dawley.

"That first defensive unit is big," noted McClellan. "They're all hockey players and they're all pretty physical."

"Our second attack group consists of three sophomores," stated McClellan. "They're small, quick and fun to watch."

That threesome of Patrick Cain, Brad Lucido and Mike Shields also helped spark the 1981 Patriots' freshman team to a perfect 14-0 record.

"We have nine sophomores on the varsity," added McClellan, "and another who has looked very strong thus far is Glen Stephens."

Senior Keith Frizzell has also played well at midfield in the early going.

Junior Dan O'Neil, the varsity back-up to Donadio last Spring, is the No. 1 goaltender this season.

Prior to their game with Bedford, the Patriots traveled to Madison, Ct. for a tournament against top high school lacrosse teams from Long Island and Connecticut.

C-C won it all, sweeping to five consecutive victories and outscoring its five over-matched foes by a whopping 48-6 margin.

Mike Lyne was named the Outstanding Player of the Tournament.

The snowstorm postponed games against Brookline and Beverly, while home games are slated this week with Framingham North and St. John's Prep.

In 14 years McClellan's C-C teams have never experienced a losing season, and they have been to the State Tournament and Eastern Mass. Tournament semifinal round and championship game several times.

The Patriots are still seeking that elusive first State crown, however, with Longmeadow and Lincoln-Sudbury dominating the scene year after year.

McClellan feels Billerica, Winchester and Burlington will be among the top North Division squads.

Lyne, Paglia perfect combo

Concord-Carlisle seniors Paul Paglia and Mike Lyne provide a 1-2 punch lacrosse coaches dream about. Since the season started, they have been the leading scorers in the state.

"They are definitely a big factor in the team's success," said Concord-Carlisle coach Jim McClellan. "Mike and Paul have helped a lot. They've even put on clinics for our freshmen."

This past week, Lyne, a middle crease attacker, took the lead with 69 points, scoring 34 goals with 35 assists. Paglia, who plays left wing attack, has scored 44 goals with 21 assists for 65 points.

"It's good working with Lyne," said Paglia. "We complement each other well. We're always doing our drills together. And during a game, we seem to know where the other is on the field without really seeing one another."

"Paul always seems to be there," said Lyne. "He can get open quickly and has a very quick release. He scores the goals and I get the assists."

McClellan says both are very aggressive and work very hard.

"Mike is rangy and slick in moving the ball," said McClellan. "He gets out of trouble. Paul is a very quick lefthanded or righthanded. He's just a little quicker and more aggressive than Mike."

Both boys have one very big thing in common - they were influenced by older brothers who played lacrosse.

"My brother Rich was the first to get me interested in lacrosse," said Paglia. "He's been a great help to me."

Rich Paglia, Jr. holds the record for most goals scored in one year (1980) at Concord-Carlisle with 59. He's a starting sophomore at Tufts.

Blair Lyne played lacrosse at Middlesex School and is now a starting junior at Bowdoin.

"My older brother Blair helps me out a lot defensively," said Lyne. "He got me interested in the game."

Parents of both boys have also been an influence on the scoring phenoms.

"The kids make fun of this," said Paglia, "but my parents go to every game, home and away. They're always encouraging me and it means a lot when my parents are at a game."

"Both my parents give me great support," said Lyne. "They go to as many games as possible."

And the parents are as proud as can be.

"We're delighted and pleased about Mike's success," said Austin Lyne, Mike's father. "Mike and Paul work beautifully together. It's fun to go to the games and watch them play."

"The least we can do is watch Paul play," said Richard Paglia, Sr. "Paul is doing exceptionally well. They all enjoy the competition and we enjoy watching."

Last Friday's game against Winchester was a perfect example of how the two work together. In a game of unbeaten teams, Paglia came up with four goals, one assist and Lyne had two goals with five assists. Lyne assisted on all four Paglia goals as Concord-Carlisle toppled Winchester, 7-3 to take sole possession of first place in the Northern Division with a 12-0 record.

Paglia and Lyne has played football at Concord-Carlisle and Lyne has been on the football and hockey teams. But right now both are concentrating solely on lacrosse.

Paglia and Lyne are college-bound in the fall and each are following in their respective brother's footsteps. Paul will join Rich at Tufts and Mike will join Blair at Bowdoin.

"The boys are very good leaders," said McClellan. "They are excellent students who are very dedicated to the game of lacrosse. They're future looks pretty good."

State lacrosse tourney

Lyne lifts Patriots

CONCORD - Senior attackman and Quad-Capt. Mike Lyne rifled home the game-winning goal with 1:49 left in the fourth period, his 101st point of the season, as the top-seeded Concord-Carlisle High lacrosse team nudged Lincoln-Sudbury 6-5 in their Mass. State Tournament quarterfinal round contest Sunday at the Patriots' field.

The dramatic victory, the 19th straight for C-C this Spring, advanced Coach Jim McClellan's EMass. League North Division champs to its state semifinal showdown against South Division champ Needham High tomorrow at 5 p.m. at the Concord-Carlisle High field.

The winner of that game will duel perennial State champion Longmeadow High for the state title on Saturday at a site and time to be announced Thursday.

C-C, now 19-0 this year and 36-3 in its last 39 games, is no stranger to the tournament semifinals. Although the Patriots have never won the entire tourney, they have reached the title game twice (losing to Longmeadow both times) and the semifinals on two other occasions.

Lyne's clutch goal completed another outstanding effort by he and his prolific linemate Paul Paglia.

Lyne, with 49 goals and 52 assists for 101 points in 19 games, netted two goals Sunday while Paglia chipped in his 64th and 65th goals and two assists to hike his season totals to 65-30-95 points.

Central Division runner-up Lincoln-Sudbury inched ahead 1-0 in the first period on a goal by midfielder Mike Murphy, but C-C battled back to net four unanswered goals in the second stanza for a 4-1 halftime advantage.

Lyne and Paglia delivered the first two tallies, both assisted by senior midfielder Chris Mariano. Later in the session Paglia set up sophomore attackman Mike Shields to make it 3-1, and senior Quad-Capt. Steve Fay wrapped up the outburst with an unassisted goal as he dodged the L-S defense and went 1-on-1 with the goalie Dave Stimmel.

The archrivals traded goals just 30 seconds apart midway through the third period, Paglia converting a Lou Goodall feed and Warriors' top marksman Craig Ward countering to make it 5-2.

Lincoln-Sudbury roared back in the final period, closing the gap to 5-4 on unassisted goals by Ward (his 31st) and Joe Harvey just moments apart.

That set the stage for the heroics by Lyne and Paglia, as the former shook his L-S defensive "shadow," Al Hoyle, and worked free for a quick pass from Paglia and shot past Stimmel.

The Warriors weren't through, however, as Jeff Frey made it 6-5 a mere 19 seconds later before C-C shut the door.

"They controlled the ball for most of the final minute," noted McClellan. "But they took a shot that missed, we cleared the ball to midfield and that was the game."

"The first half we controlled the majority of the faceoffs," continued the veteran Patriots' coach. "The second half was exactly the opposite, and they were able to get back in the game."

"The first time we played them (7-6 regular season win for Concord-Carlisle) there weren't enough

groundballs," stated McClellan. "Sunday the ball seemed to be on the ground the entire game, and we handled the ball extremely well."

C-C junior goaltender Dan O'Neil, who was also sharp in a tourney-opening 16-8 triumph over Burlington, came up with 13 saves Sunday as the Patriots enjoyed a 25-18 shooting advantage.

McClellan also lauded the defensive work of Quad-Capt. Mike Spangler, junior Chris Wickwire and crease defenseman John Dawley.

"They had trouble penetrating all day, except on fastbreaks," explained McClellan.

The C-C skipper feels his team, which beat Lincoln-Sudbury twice in the same season for the first time in five years, can play better.

"For some reason we seem to get nervous whenever we play Lincoln-Sudbury," he offered. "I'm not sure why, other than the fact its a great rivalry. But Sunday they really came on strong towards the end. If the

Fourth-seeded Lincoln-Sudbury, which nipped Billerica 5-3 in its tourney opener, completed the season with a 14-5 overall record.

Concord-Carlisle and Needham (14-4) met once during the regular season, and the Patriots emerged with a resounding 15-4 victory.

"They have two All-Scholastic attackmen in Steve Hauptman (74 goals) and Bob Kelly (60 assists), and an outstanding midfielder named Heffernan," commented McClellan. "They're playing much better lacrosse now than when we faced them earlier, so it should be an excellent game."

Third-seeded Needham has battled to the semifinal round with victories over Weymouth North (16-4) and surprising Winchester (12-11 in overtime).

Twenty down, one to go

CONCORD - Twenty in a row and one more to go.

That could be the battle cry for the awesome Concord-Carlisle High lacrosse team, which reached the Eastern Mass. Tournament championship game following an impressive 15-11 semifinal round conquest of Needham High yesterday before an estimated 2,000 fans at the Patriots' field.

The Mike Lyne-Paul Paglia connection was operating on all cylinders again, as the prolific pair accounted for 11 goals and 20 total points against Needham.

The triumph pushed Coach Jim McClellan's crew, now 20-0 this Spring, to a title showdown against perennial State champion Longmeadow High (15-2) tomorrow (Friday) afternoon at 4:30 p.m. at the Concord-Carlisle High field.

Needham, a somewhat surprising semifinalist following victories over Weymouth North and Winchester, took a 2-1 lead over the Patriots midway through the first period yesterday.

However, C-C battled back for a 3-2 advantage after one stanza and never trailed thereafter. It was 7-3 at halftime, but Needham scored twice early in the third period to make it 7-5 before Concord-Carlisle pulled away again.

Pesky Needham cut the deficit to 13-11 with approximately three minutes left, but Paglia pocketed an unassisted goal and then set Lyne up for a second insurance tally in the final minute.

Paglia finished the contest with seven goals and three assists, while Lyne contributed four goals and six assists. Both were single-game season highs for each, although both Paglia and Lyne rarely play more than half the game. Lyne now boasts 53 goals and 58 assists for 111 points in 20 games, while Paglia has 72 goals and 33 assists for 105 points.

Senior midfielder and Quad-Capt. Steve Fay chipped in one goal and one assist yesterday, while other marksmen with one goal apiece were

senior midfielder Mike Robichaud, midfielder Miguel Echavarri and sophomore attackman Pat Cain.

Leading the Needham offense were top gun Steve Hauptman with three goals and three assists, line-mate Bob Kelly with four goals and two assists, and midfielder Mike Hefernan who had 11 shots on net and came away with one goal and one assist.

C-C junior goaltender Dan O'Neil, who has been spectacular throughout the tournament, was credited with 27 saves yesterday as Needham outshot the Patriots by a slim 38-32 margin including 23-17 in the second half.

"We played Needham early in the year, the second or third game, and we beat them 15-4," noted McClellan. "I knew they would score more goals this time around, but we were a little more balanced and we played more people (close to 30).

"I'm pleased with our overall execution, but I know we can play better," continued the C-C coach. "We made some mistakes and had a number of penalties. One of the big keys was our work on faceoffs. We won 17 of 27 and that helped us control the ball."

McClellan lauded the performances of senior midfielder Chris Mariano, UNH recruit Steve Fay and Echavarri. "Fay is a very explosive player," commented McClellan. "He's extremely dangerous offensively."

No Massachusetts high school has dominated a particular sport like Longmeadow has controlled the lacrosse scene, winning nine State titles in the last 11 years.

This time, however, Concord-Carlisle probably rates a slight edge as it plays in its first final since 1977 when Longmeadow beat the Pats.

"Longmeadow has an excellent defensive team when they're clicking, and their stick skills are always among the best in the State," stated McClellan. "I know with our 20-0 record everyone wants to beat us, but I just hope this is our year."

Longmeadow, a Western Mass. suburb of Springfield, has actually been sitting around for two weeks waiting for this game. They received a special invitation to the Eastern Mass. Tournament when MIAA officials eliminated the State Tournaments this year, so they've had an opportunity to scout Concord-Carlisle in its three post-season victories over Burlington (16-8), Lincoln-Sudbury (6-5) and Needham.

Concord rolls to final, 15-11

Concord-Carlisle keeps polishing its image as the New York Islanders of high school lacrosse. With precise passers on offense and pesky pokers on defense, the gold and maroon have proved tough to beat all season.

Needham was the latest victim, 15-11, yesterday in the semifinals of the EMass boys' lacrosse tournament at Concord. Concord (19-0) will entertain Longmeadow (14-2) tomorrow at 4:30 p.m. for the championship.

"The kids all played well; they were having a lot of fun out there," said coach Jim McClellan. "They were loose and didn't make too many mistakes."

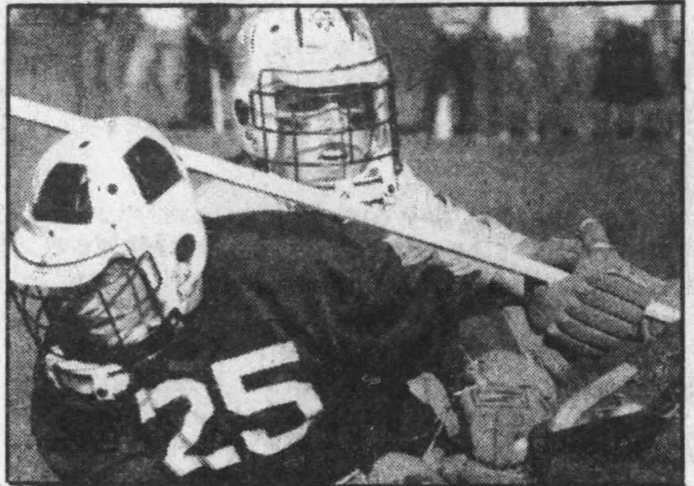
Concord's senior cocaptains, Mike Lyne, Paul Paglia, Steve Fay and Mike Spangler, guided the victors by compiling 11 goals and nine assists among them.

"We played a good game," said Needham coach John Bamberry. "We just didn't have the skills to keep up with them. They beat us, 15-7, during the season. So we did a little better this time."

Concord opened up with a commanding attack. Lyne, with an assist from Paglia, scored at 9:31 of the first quarter. But Needham came right back when attackman Bob Kelly took the faceoff down the field and put it in the net 16 seconds later.

Needham then went ahead on a power play. Cocaptain Steve Hauptman scored the first of his two with 8:22 left in the quarter from attackman Dan Stewart.

This was to be the last lead for Needham.

"We played a lot better than we have been playing," said Lyne. "The whole team was clicking; it was great."

Goalie Dan O'Neil played superbly, thwarting Needham's potent offense with several outstanding stops.

With 36 seconds left in the first period, Concord went up, 3-2, when Lou Goodall passed from behind the net to Paglia, who stung the ball past goalie Russell Shaw.

Needham came out hard in the third quarter. Steve Hauptman passed to Jack Anderson from behind the net and Anderson put it in at 10:22, to make the score 7-5.

Concord had its biggest lead, six goals, early in the fourth period, but it quickly dropped to three. Bob Kelly took a pass from Hauptman in front to put Needham within three at 6:12.

Anderson stole the ball his his own end, passed to Kelly, who then passed to Jim Connolly in the Concord end. Connolly put the ball past O'Neil to bring Needham within two with 3:01 left.

But less than 15 seconds later Concord came back. Lyne took a pass from Paglia and fired it in to restore the three-goal lead.

End of a perfect season

CONCORD - Nobody thought it would be easy, not even All-Scholastic senior attackman Paul Paglia.

But, as a drizzly dusk settled over the field, the lights on the Concord-Carlisle High scoreboard didn't lie.

The Patriots had just completed as fine a lacrosse season as they could possibly have put together, stunning perennial Western Massachusetts power Longmeadow High 15-6 to complete a 21-0 campaign that included North Division and Eastern Mass. Tournament championships.

Paglia scored six goals to lead the way, including three straight within a five-minute span in the second period when C-C blew the game open and took a commanding 10-3 half-time lead.

"The Longmeadow tradition (nine State titles in 13 years) was on our mind alot the last two days," admitted Paglia. "We knew they were really good, and we'd heard stories about their program, but since I've been here we had never played them.

"I was expecting a down-to-the-wire one-goal game," continued Paglia, who finished the season with an incredible school-record 78 goals and 34 assists for 112 points.

"They were a little cocky at the beginning, doing all those high-5's in the warmups," stated Paglia. "But we just went crazy out there because we wanted it so much. I don't think they expected us to jump on them right away, and when we did it look like they really got scared. There was just this look on their faces.

"I think another big factor was that we're in incredible shape," added Paglia. "We do an awful lot of running in practice. They tried to tire us out, but by the second half it looked like their defensemen were dragging."

"We play 30 kids in almost every game," related C-C Coach Jim McClellan, whose team was winning the whole thing for the first time in its illustrious lacrosse history. "I use four midfielders, and it really doesn't matter to me who's on the field because I have confidence in them all.

"The kids were just flying today. I knew we were ready physically, but I've been working on the mental part of it the last two days. It's a tribute to our players' dedication," observed McClellan.

Longmeadow, which defeated Concord-Carlisle in the 1977 State final, entered the contest with a 15-2 record. The visitors were undefeated against high school competition, having bowed only to Phillips-Andover Academy and Wilbraham-Munson Academy.

"I picked up some information on them from the Andover coach," noted McClellan. "Don't forget they received a free ride into this game (special invitation after the demise of the 1981-82 State tournies), so they had a chance to scout us four times. I don't know if the (two-week) layoff hurt them at all, but I know playing four tournament games left us pretty bruised and banged up heading into this one."

The Patriots took control right from the outset, jumping to a 3-1 first period lead on goals three minutes apart by senior midfielder and Quad-Capt. Steve Fay, Paglia and sophomore attackman Pat Cain.

The lone answering fire for Longmeadow came from Steve Snyder, who was the first to beat C-C junior

goaltender Dan O'Neil with just over two minutes left in the period.

Paglia, on an assist from linemate Mike Lyne who set up five goals yesterday to finish the year with 53 goals and 63 assists for 116 points, traded early second stanza goals with Gordon Fisk just 24 seconds apart to make it 4-2.

That's when the floodgates opened, as the Patriots snapped in six straight goals to take a commanding 10-2 lead.

Senior attackman Lou Goodall's unassisted goal, the first of his three, was followed in rapid-fire succession by three from Paglia (within a 2:22 span) and a pair 20 seconds apart by

senior midfielder and UNH recruit Mike Robichaud.

"We won seven of 11 faceoffs in the period, and that was a big factor," commented McClellan.

Longmeadow mounted a mild third period challenge on goals by Fisk and Dave Jones, cutting the gap

to 10-5, but Goodall (Lyne assist) and Paglia (Fay) countered for the Pats before the period ended.

The champs wrapped up their offense with fourth quarter goals by sophomore midfielder Glenn Stephens (unassisted), Robichaud and Goodall, while Longmeadow mustered a final marker by Brian Lantz.

"It was the best game we've played all season, by far," stated Paglia, who had never played lacrosse before his freshman year in high school. "We put everything together ... the offense, the defense and the hustle in groundball situations. It's a great way to finish."

Paglia's 78-goal total, of which 62 came during the regular season, broke older brother Rich Paglia's school record of 59 goals in a single year.

Next Spring Paul, who was a wing-back and outside linebacker in football, will join brother Rich at Tufts University.

"Paul succeeds with hard work," explained McClellan. "He's not exceptionally fast, but he's very quick, his skills are outstanding and he has a lot of heart."

McClellan also lauded the play of senior defenseman Mike Spangler, Lyne and O'Neil (24 saves) against Longmeadow.

"Danny O'Neil played out of his mind, as usual," laughed McClellan. "He's something else. We shoot on him at practice and he always tells the kids to shoot harder."

The key graduates from this exceptional Maroon and Gold team will be Paglia, Lyne, Fay, Robichaud, Spangler, Goodall, Chris Mariano, Mark Ridick, John Dawley and Miguel Echavarri.

But don't bet that C-C won't be back up there again in 1983.

"I really can't say why the school has such good teams every year," shrugged Paglia. "Except that we have good coaching."

"I'm always after the kids to go to camps," noted McClellan. "And we create interest in the program with a lot of fund-raising events."

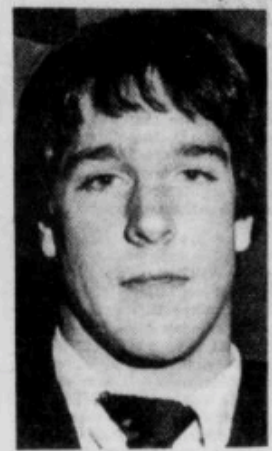

PAUL PAGLIA Concord-Carlisle Attack Player-of-the-Year

Paul, a senior quad-captain and attackman, netted an incredible 78 points and passed out 34 assists for 112 points as the second lead scorer in the State for the undefeated Patriots' powerhouse.

A varsity member for four years and a regular for two seasons, Paul completed his high school career with close to 200 points.

The 78 goals was a new single-season school record, ironically shattering the old mark of 59 established three years ago by Paul's brother Rich Paglia (now at Tufts).

An All-Scholastic choice, Paul capped his senior campaign with a memorable six-goal explosion against Longmeadow High as C-C demolished the nine-time State champions 15-6 in their Eastern Mass. Tournament title game.

Mike, a senior, led the State in scoring this Spring with 116 points on 53 goals and 63 assists.

He, like Paglia, only played in half of many Patriots' games. Lyne finished his two-year varsity career with close to 200 points.

"Mike probably has a little more range than Paul," noted McClellan. "He's a tremendous all-around player, but his biggest strength is his ability to feed his linemates in close to the net."

Lyne is a two-time Eastern Mass. North Division All-Star who missed making All-Scholastic by the slimmest of margins.
