Concord-Carlisle

Head coach Jim McClellan saw a load of lacrosse talent go through the doors at graduation last year, and as a result, "We have a lot of rebuilding to do," he says.

McClellan will probably be happy if his Patriots can come anywhere near last year's phenomenal record, as Concord-Carlisle went 21-0 and won the Eastern Mass. Tournament Championship.

"It will be twice as hard the second time around," said McClellan, whose team won 20 games in 1980 and was 17-3 in '81. This is his 14th year at the helm at C-C.

Amond the losses from last year's super team are Sun Players of the Year Mike Lyne and Paul Paglia, the State's two leading scorers last season. Leaving with them are Lyne's 53 goals and 63 assists and Paglia's school record 78 goals and 34 assists.

Lyne is attending Bowdoin and Paglia is at Tufts. Also graduated from last year's team were standout midfielder Steve Fay, now at UNH, and defender Mike Spangler, who is at Georgetown. "They were our backbone," says McClellan.

Leading the list of returnees are senior captains Dan O'Neil, Chris Wickwire and Mark McCarter. O'Neil is the goalie, Wickwire a defenseman and McCarter at the midfield.

Other top midfielders will be juniro Chris Shanley, Glen Stevens and Chris Swindell. Brian First is a promising defenseman.

McClellan says he would like to see a little more offense from his midfielders.

The first attack team "has been together since their freshman year," said McClellan. "They should be coming right along. I think you're going to see a lot of goals from them." The all-junior line consists of Mike Shields, Pat Cain and Brad Lucido.

The Patriots scrimmaged at Wilbraham-Munson Academy last weekend and went up against three-time New York State champ West Genesee, possibly the best high school team in

the country.

C-C has no lack of bodies, with 40 freshman team candidates, 35 JV's and 40 varsity players. McClellan is trying to trim the roster prior to the opener Wednesday at home against Brookline.

Concord-Carlisle the champ again

CONCORD - Concord-Carlisle's polished lacrosse machine pumped out eight second-half goals and stormed by Newton North, 10-3, to capture its second consecutive Eastern Mass. title.

Concord will meet Longmeadow for the state championship tomorrow at Tahanto Regional in Boylston.

Concord-Carlisle dominated play throughout and would have been on the plus side of a blowout if not for the gravity-defying performance turned in by Ed Cohen, Newton North's senior goalie.

Cohen stopped 13 first-half shots, the majority of which were tough chances, to allow Newton North to stay in the game. It was down, 2-1, going into the third quarter.

"Ed Cohen was outstanding," said Newton North coach Richard Clark. "He kept us in the game as long as he could, but they took the game because they just played a better overall game."

Newton North enjoyed a brief one-goal advantage early in the first quarter, just as it did during the first confrontation this season between the two teams, won by Concord, 8-3, in Newton. Junior attacker Tom Ryan burst straight in on goalie Dan O'Neill and slung a shot into the net just 38 seconds into the game.

But attacker Brad Lucido, who had earlier suffered a crushing shot to the head that would eventually sideline him with a mild concussion, snuck around the back of the net, lunged forward and stuffed a shot by Cohen to tie the game.

Both teams continued to play conservatively for most of the first half, with Concord controlling most of the action but being continually thwarted by Cohen. Concord-Carlisle finally broke the tedium at 4:20 of the second quarter, when Skip Fatkin took a pass from Patrick Cain (two goals and an assist) and scored from just in front of the net for a 2-1 advantage. It would not trail for the rest of the game.

Concord-Carlisle had seven players involved in the scoring, led by Chris Shanley (three goals, one assist), Cain and Lucido (two goals).

Lucido scored five goals the first time the two teams met and was haunted through most of yesterday's game. The first-period blow to the head was not intentional, but it did temporarily stifle the performance of the gutsy 5-foot-4 attacker.

"Brad was dizzy for a while after he got hit," said Concord-Carlisle coach Jim McClellan. "He forgot most of the first half, including the goal he scored. He already was playing with a bad knee, but he has so much desire."

CONCORD - Like the Indians and the Japanese, the Concord-Carlisle lacrosse team yesterday learned that attacking out of the sun sometimes is a good idea.

Leading just 2-1 at halftime, Concord-Carlisle coach Jim McLellan told his troops to shoot with the sinking sun at their backs and that move helped C-C pop eight goals into the Newton North net to capture its second consecutive Eastern Mass. Championship, 10-3.

The Pats had several glittering opportunities in the first half yesterday, but Newton North senior All-Scholastic goalie Ed. Cohen put on a super show, stopping 13 shots in the first two periods alone.

"We knew he was a good goalie," said McLelland. "But we didn't change anything that we've been doing all season. We made a few small adjustments and kept on going at them."

One of the adjustment was taking advantage of the twilight, as the game started at 5:30. "I told them to shoot from the sun just like the Indians would," said McLellan.

N-N actually took a 1-0 lead 38 seconds into the game, but C-C came back with attacker Brad Lucido scoring to tie it, then Skip Fatkin put the Patriots ahead to stay in the second quarter.

In the second half Concord's shots finally began to find their mark, while goalie Dan O'Neill made all the required stops at

Chris Shanley put home three goals in the second half, Lucido scored his second of the game and Patrick Cain netted a pair of goals in the final two quarters for C-C.



C-C will need Lucido and all its other horses in top form tomorrow. Longmeadow is going to be one tough nut to crack, but if there is a team in the State that can do it, it has to be the Patriots.

"It should be a good game," said McLellan. "They're a well-balanced and well-skilled team. They have 11 sophomores so they have a lot of hungry kids."

Wickwire, a varsity standout since his sophomore year, is headed to Johns Hopkins University in the fall on a partial lacrosse scholarship. He is the first player from this area to be recruited by the prestigious lacrosse power.

"He's got great skills and very good potential," stated coach Jim McClellan. "He's got big, stong legs and he's improved a lot over the years."

Wickwire, an All-Northern Div. first team selection, was chosen to play in the North-South United States All-Star game at Johns Hopkins but when the State final with Longmeadow went into five sudden death overtimes he missed his flight and missed that contest.

Wickwire, a good student, also played soccer and football in his days at Concord-Carlisle.

GLENN STEPHENS Concord-Carlisle Midfielder

Another of Concord-Carlisle's talented players, this junior "was our controller at the midfield," according to coach Jim McClellan.

"He's not a scorer, but he controls the ball as well as anyone. And he's probably the strongest kid on the team running and strength-wise."

Stephens is another All-Northern Division first team selection as a middie and will be back to anchor the Patriots next year.

"He's the guy we want on the field at the important times," said McClellan. "He was on almost the whole fourth period

and for all of the five overtimes against Longmeadow" in the State final.

DAN O'NEIL Concord-Carlisle Goaltender

This senior has been the Patriots' MVP for the last two years and although he sometimes had lonely games what with Concord's outstanding field play, O'Neil showed that he could more than do the job when called upon.

In this year's EMass. Tournament the three-year varsity starter allowed one goal against St. John's, three against Billerica (with 13 saves), one against Newton North (with 14 saves) and made 22 saves in the five-OT loss to Longmeadow.

"We know what he can do," said coach Jim McClellan. "Some people say we've got the fortress in front of him, but when he's been tested he's played very well.

"It's a unique position. You're the last line of defense but you can also be an offensive threat. He's glorified the goal position around here. A lot of kids in the summer leagues want to play goal now because of him. And he's got a super personality."

O'Neil has accepted a fouryear scholarship from Ohio-Wesleyan University, played in the Senior All-Star Game and was selected to the All-Northern Division first team.

If the theory that good defense stops good offense is true, it isn't hard to figure out why Concord-Carlisle has been such a powerhouse in recent years. 
JIM McCLELLAN......CONCORD-CARLISLE

Lucido, one of three juniors on the team, may not possess tremendous size, but he was one of the most explosive goal scorers to step on the field this year. At attack, the 5-4, 130pounder pumped in 42 regular-season goals to lead Concord-Carlisle, and had 53 total points. Lucido is also a Division 2 state champion and a Globe All-Scholastic wrestler. He is a member of the National Honor Society and, although only a junior, has set his sights on Brown University.



Lucido, a junior, scored 52 goals (with 15 assists) this season and popped in eight during the EMass. Tournament. And most of it was done while he was severely hampered by a leg injury.

"He gave us some superhuman efforts," said C-C coach Jim McClellan. "He was on one leg for most of the season and he missed three games with cartilege problems. He's all desire and heart.'

The All-Northern Division first-team All-Star scored an unbelievable goal to tie up Longmeadow with 30 seconds left in regulation in the State final. "We have it on the video," said McClellan. "Brad is straight out just like Bobby Orr was in that famous picture after the Stanley Cup goal.'

Lucido, who was to undergo surgery on his knee this month, is one of the top students in his class. The 5'4", 121-pounder also was a State wrestling champion this winter.

GLENN STEPHENS CONCORD-CARLISLE
Stephens provided Concord-Carlisle with the type of midfield consistency necessary in the makeup of a championship team. His crisp outlet passing set up the majority of its scoring plays and his solid defense kept it in many tight games. Stephens, just a junior, scored 12 goals for the North Division champion. The 5-11, 160-pounder also played football and started at defensive halfback. Stephens enjoys skiing, tennis and swimming. He is undecided about college.
