"It's going to help the Division 2 teams," said Concord-Carlisle coach Jim McClellan, the Globe's coach of the year last season. "It'll help keep them

year last season. "It'll help keep them competitive. They won't have any fears about playing teams like us, Lincoln-Sudbury and Billerica." But with the good also comes the bad. In years past, the strong teams could schedule weak ones in order to make the 70 percent needed to qualify for the tourney.

"It takes away two possible teams that could've made the tourney under the old system," said Billerica coach Paul Breault "but it'll be competitive. It's good for the sport."

"The realignment of the leagues will take its toll," said new Lincoln-Sud-bury coach Scott Burt. "You finish one big game and then you have to play another. It's a good change because it'll be more difficult for one team to dominate

Longmeadow retains state crown for fifth year

BOYLSTON - The Longmeadow High School trophy case is in desperate need of expansion.

The boys from the Springfield suburb scored a decisive 12-7 victory over Concord-Carlisle in the MIAA Division 1 lacrosse final at Tahanto Regional High School here yesterday. It was their fifth straight state championship (excluding1982, when state tournaments were not held) and their 10th overall, a remarkable feat considering only 14 have been held.

Amazingly, they scored on half of their 24 shots yesterday – and they were outshot, 36-24. That scoring efficiency, combined with the nifty netminding of goalie Greg Lowell, put any Concord-Carlisle trophy aspirations out of reach:

Longmeadow's powerful offense, which averaged 14 goals this season, was dormant in the first 21 minutes of the game, as Concord-Carlisle took a 2-0 lead. But Longmeadow exploded late in the second quarter, scoring four times in just over two minutes. Jon Fisk, Ed Carey, Greg Collins and Brian McLaughlin found openings, giving Longmeadow a lead it would never relinquish. Fisk's two goals were his 74th and 75th, a school record.

"Once they took the lead, they took the game away in every way," lamented Concord-Carlisle captain Brad Lucido.

Concord-Carlisle tallied first in the second half, cutting the lead to 5-3, but Carey (two) and John Sheehan added three consecutive goals to stifle the comeback.

"We had to change our offense to

spread them out so we could get going ... This one really means something," said Longmeadow coach Dan Kane, pointing out that his squad had just six seniors compared with Concord-Carlisle's 22.

Glenn Stephens picked up two fourthquarter goals for the losers, but John Burke countered with two for Longmeadow as it continued the barrage on goalkeeper Jeff Saef, who had just one save in the second half.

Meanwhile, Lowell was terrific at the other end of the sweltering field, saving several seemingly sure goals.

Lacrosse preview: C-C favored again

Graduation took with it two of the state's best players in defenseman Chris Wickwire and goalie Dan O'Neil.

Wickwire was touted by many as the best player in the state last year, and is currently flaunting his talents for another great lacrosse institution – Johns Hopkins University – presently the second-ranked team in the nation.

O'Neil was considered by many to be the best goaltender in Massachusetts last year. He's currently playing at Ohio Wesleyan.

"We lost about six kids, mostly midfielders," McClellan said. "We're gonna have to fill a few holes."

Finding personnel to fill in for graduating seniors has never really been a problem for C-C, and this season is no exception. McClellan had 130 candidates show up on the first day of practice, including 28 seniors.

This abundance of manpowerhas in fact caused problems for McClellan, who likes to operate on a no-cut policy.

"I've got to get my team down to 30 players," McClellan said. "The problem is that I have 28 seniors. I can't keep them all, and I don't want to cut any of them. They've been in the program right along, and I'm sort of obligated to them.

"The strange thing is that some the kids I'll probably end up cutting will probably go on to play college lacrosse," he said. "I think we've created a monster. It's probably the most popular program at Concord."

Seniors cannot play on a junior varsity team, according to MIAA rules, so McClellan is trying to strike up a plan where C-C would enter a varsity team in Division II.

"We may be able to get away with a team in Division II, just for the kids I can't keep on the varsity now," McClellan said. "Right now we also have two freshmen teams and a junior varsity."

Depth will certainly not be one of McClellan's worries this season, but inexperience may.

"I have a lot of seniors, but it doesn't really matter what year they're in if they didn't improve from last year," McClellan said. "We have a lot of kids, but in certain positions, like goaltending, we're green."

Because of O'Neil's heroics over the past four years, McClellan has had very little time to develop many goalies. Right now senior Jeff Saef will get the starting nod, while junior Peter Cox will be the backup.

The defense should continue to be strong again this season, even in Wickwire's wake. The Patriot backfielders will be centered around seniors Brian First, Marc Moreau, John Scotnicki, and Rich Goodall.

McClellan plans to carry three groups of midfielders, with senior star and quad-capt. Glenn Stephens leading the first line. Last year Stephens was a force at midfield, and was C-C's ball control specialist.

Stephens will be surrounded by senior Dave Witherell and high-scoring senior Chris Shanley.

The second group consists of seniors Chris Swindell and Evin Ho, and junior Paul Martin.

"That second group is excellent at attacking, and can run all day," McClellan said.

The third midfield will consist of seniors Jeff Shay, Brian McLaughlin and Peter Lee, and possibly senior Shane Kielmeyer.

The Concord-Carlisle attack is also very deep in talent and numbers. McClellan will go with basically two attack groups.

Brad Lucido is the key to the C-C first attack group. The senior quad-capt. pumped in 52 goals and 15 assists last season, most of if while hampered with a leg injury. He is surrounded by senior quad-capt. Mike Shields and senior Paul Johanson.


The second attack group is youthful, but deep in talent. McClellan feels that this is his first attack of the future. Sophomores Dave Moreau and John Francini will team up with junior Chip Twitty.

Concord's main preseason encounter thus far came at the Dan Hand 'Tourney in Madison, Ct. The tourney consisted of 12 of the East Coast's best high school lacrosse teams battling it out in a series of "mini-games".

"I think we fared pretty well in the tourney," McClellan said. "We won a couple of games and lost a few close games - I was pleased with the results." MIKE SHIELDS......CONCORD-CARLISLE Shields led Concord-Carlisle in scoring this year with 39 goals and 42 assists and is one tough customer to opposing defensemen. The senior cocaptain is a two-time Division 1 North All-Star and is a vital contributor to Concord-Carlisle's success. He is also an outstanding soccer player, being named to the Dual County League All-Star team, and was the team captain in the fall. Shields combines excellent stickhandling skills with an accurate shot, but also has the ability to find the open man in traffic. A camping lover, Shields will attend Ohio Wesleyan in the fall.

Like many others on the All-Scholastic team, Stephens is a two-sport standout. He was selected as the most valuable player of the Concord-Carlisle football team this past fall and was named to the Duai County League All-Star team as a defensive back. In lacrosse, Stephens has been a Division 1 North All-Star the past two seasons and will play in the North-South All-Star game at Johns Hopkins.
