## Concord-Carlisle deals L-S 1st loss

SUDBURY - After a sluggish start, Concord-Carlisle played the kind of lacrosse that its fans are accustomed to watching as it downed previously undefeated Lincoln-Sudbury, 11-9, in an Eastern Mass. West Division game yesterday.

"We adjusted our defense a little because they were toying with us," said Concord-Carlisle coach Dick Kerr. "We were double-teaming and leaving a man open in front of the crease. Once we changed that, the defense played well."

The home team took an early 2-0 lead on a pair of goals from Kevin Bohne before Max Kaufman got C-C on the board, twisting past two defenders and sending a bounce shot past Ryan Jewell.

Lincoln-Sudbury (8-1) scored the next two goals. Ken Bekampis converted a pass from behind the net, and Todd Smith zipped in a 15-footer after taking a soft pass from Tim Dolan.

Concord-Carlisle then seized control, ripping off the next three goals to tie the game, 4-4.

Dan Wells scored back-to-back goals, and Dave Kingman fired home a cross-slot pass from Campbell Rowe.

The visitors were momentarily caught napping after Kingman's goal. Attackman Adam Cefalo charged in off the ensuing faceoff and bounced a shot past netminder

Billy Hackett to give L-S a 5-4 lead.

C-C (11-0) tied the game seconds later when Dave Fivek drilled a 15-foot shoulder-high shot past Jewell, and the teams were deadlocked, 5-5, at the half.

The momentum shifted several times in the third quarter, with Kerr's troops jumping out to a 7-5 lead before L-S stormed back with two goals in the last two minutes to tie it.

Brad Glowacki scored less than two minutes into the half when he picked up a rebound from behind the net and stuffed a quick shot past Jewell. Four minutes later, Jewell was called for interference, and Glowacki made the penalty hurt, scoring an unassisted goal.

Bekampis notched his second goal when he charged through the crease and beat Hackett with a bounce shot while being hauled down from behind. Eric Norwood tied the game for L-S, picking up a rebound in front of an empty net and lifting it home.

C-C put the game away early in the fourth quarter on goals by Fivek, Glowacki and Kingman.

Smith and Dolan scored late goals for L-S, but it was too little, too late. Glowacki closed the scoring with 2:38 left, converting a pass from Wells on a two-on-one break.

"Every time it's gotten close this year, this team has responded," said Kerr of his top-ranked squad. "We've been in close situations before, and something always ignites them."

# National reputation follows Concord lacrosse star

**C**ONCORD - Whoever the foe, Rick Mullins' lacrosse stick is mightily respected throughout the national sports scene.

A former defenseman for Concord-Carlisle High School lacrosse team, Mullins is a junior defenseman for the University of Massachusetts at Amherst team, and it is not unusual to see him tear up and down the field holding his opponents in check.

"Being on the playing field is like nothing else. It's fantastic," he said recently at his home after returning from the annual All American luncheon in Baltimore.

Mullins, a 1987 Concord-Carlisle High School graduate and the co-captain of the 1987 High School

State Champion lacrosse team, was recently picked as an All American Lacrosse Defense player by the National College Athletic Association.

His career started when he was 9 years old and participated in a lacrosse clinic run by former high school coach, Jim McLellan. This summer, Mullins has been running a similar lacrosse clinic two nights a week for young players.

"Lacrosse is a game where you can score three goals in a minute and pull off a win," he stresses to the youth attending his clinic. "You are not out of it until the final horn, but, even then, if you've done the best you can, you've played a decent game, regardless of the score."

The son of Anna and Dick Mullins, he is also invited to other lacrosse camps during the school recess.

When it comes to playing for the

UMass team, "You have to be tightly organized to fit in classes, studies, meals, practice and games," he says. "It's even somewhat of a problem to get a good night's sleep before the Saturday games because the rest of the students party in the dormitories on Friday nights. When I have to, I crash off campus at a friend's apartment."

As a high school athlete, Mullins played football as well, and was courted for the lacrosse team by several colleges, including the University of New Hampshire, Rutgers, Syracuse and UMass.

He was chosen as a Globe All-Scholastic for the 1986-87 lacrosse team, and in his senior year of high school he was awarded the Athletic Award Medallion by the Concord-Carlisle Booster Club.

Following high school, Mullins attended Bridgton Academy where

he was named to the all New England Prep School Lacrosse Team before entering the University of Massachusetts in the fall of 1988.

At Amherst, he won one of the 35 slots in the university's varsity lacrosse team after vying with 80 players for one of the positions.

At the conclusion of the 1989 lacrosse season, Mullins was named All American and member of the second New England team picked by coaches. By spring of this year, Mullins made the first team and again his team made the playoffs and ended up ranking seventh in the nation.

Voted All American, an unusual honor for a sophomore, Mullins was also elected captain of the defense for the 1991 season, an honor usually reserved for seniors.

North will play top-seeded Concord-Carlisle in Tuesday's EMass championship game.

C-C earned its trip by ripping defending EMass champion Newton North, 13-5. C-C, which improved to 20-0, raced to a 2-0 lead just 55 seconds into the contest and slowly pulled away, going up, 6-3, at the half and 9-4 after three periods. Brad Glowacki (3 goals, 3 assists), Mike Zentz (4 goals, 1 assist) and Max Kaufman (2 goals, 2 assists) led the offense.

# Fast start gives Concord-Carlisle title

CONCORD - It took just 39 seconds for Concord-Carlisle to show who was the king of EMass lacrosse.

Junior attackman Brad Glowacki rifled home Campbell Rowe's pass with 39 seconds gone in the first quarter and CC never looked back, pinning a 9-6 loss on Weymouth North yesterday to capture the EMass lacrosse title.

CC will host Central/Western Mass. champion Longmeadow Saturday at 1 to settle the state title. Longmeadow earned its trip to the final by defeating Westfield, 20-7.

Glowacki and senior midfielder Mike Zentz led the offense for Dick Kerr's club, scoring three goals each and keeping North's normally smothering defense baffled.

"They beat us - twice," said North coach Tony Manzelli, whose club suffered its only regular-season defeat at the hands of CC. "They were better. Give them all the credit in the world."

CC, which improved to 21-0, jumped to a 4-1 advantage after the first and held a 6-4 lead at the half.

"I told the kids before the game that the game would be won in the midfield," said Kerr, whose midfielders scored six goals to North's two. "And that's the way it turned out."

Weymouth North, which will merge with Weymouth South next school year because of budget cuts, was led by junior Joe Donovan and freshman Dan Daley, who scored two goals apiece.

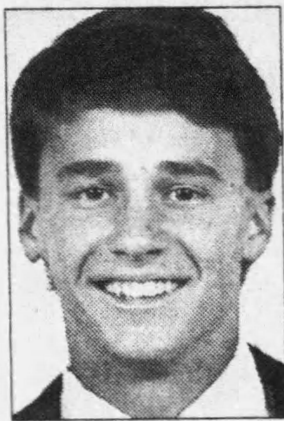
"The ride has got to end sooner or later," said Manzelli. "There's nothing you can say to these kids now to make them feel better. This one is going to hurt for a while."

# Glowaki adapts to changes

When Brad Glowaki transferred to Concord-Carlisle from Wilton (Conn.) High, he knew he'd be in for some changes - he didn't know just how drastic those changes would be.

Last spring, Brad was patrolling center field for Wilton. Just one year later, with virtually no lacrosse experience heading into this season, Glowaki was leading C-C to an undefeated regular season and an appearance in the state lacrosse final.

The junior attackman led his team in scoring with 53 goals and 33 assists. He was a monster in the tournament, averaging three goals a game as C-C captured the EMass title before bowing to Longmeadow, 14-7, in the state final.

Glowaki wasn't a complete stranger to the game, his older brother Chris was an all-state defenseman for Wilton, a perennial lacrosse powerhouse. But baseball was his game.

"I used to go to my brother's games and watch him play, I even used to play around imitating the attackman's moves, but I never gave much thought to playing," said Glowaki. "I always stuck with baseball."

When C-C lacrosse coach Dick Kerr learned

that a transfer from Wilton had arrived, his heart started to race - after all Wilton was known as a lacrosse school.

Glowaki, who had Kerr as a gym teacher, informed him that his lacrosse knowledge was limited. That didn't discourage Kerr, however, he saw flashes of Glowaki's athletic ability in gym class.

"The first thing we do in gym class is play lacrosse," said Kerr. "And right away I could see he had tremendous athletic skill. Then we started playing flag football and he was so tough to guard one-on-one, I knew he could be an outstanding attackman."

Still a little skeptical, Glowaki took Kerr's advice and decided to take a shot at playing lacrosse.

"I decided to play because I realized that you don't have to be blessed with tremendous size," said the 5-foot-7-inch, 155-pound Glowaki. "If you have enough stick skill than you can make up for it."

"When I first saw him play he reminded me so much of Nick Boynton (the 1987 player of the year, now at Syracuse)," said Kerr. "Brad had the same acceleration and quick first step."

Glowaki still wasn't convinced that lacrosse was his sport.

"I kept having second thoughts every time I put my helmet on," said Glowaki who also plays

football and basketball for C-C. "But Mr. Kerr gave me so much confidence he kept telling me that good things were going to happen and they always did."

According to Kerr, Glowaki's most outstanding quality is his ability to see the entire field.

"The key to being a good attackman is field vision," said Kerr. "You have to be able to make split-second decisions, quick changes and quick assessments. It took him a while to learn, but for somebody who has only been playing a year he's outstanding, all he needs is more time."

As far as the future is concerned, both Glowaki and Kerr are looking forward to next season.

"We'll have a strong nucleus coming back and our goal is to win the state championship," said Glowaki who credits his parents, Bob and Kathy with being very supportive of his athletic choices.

"With Brad and [attackman] Danny Wells coming back plus some pretty good midfielders we should have a phenomenal attack," said Kerr. "I'm putting out an all-points-bulletin for some defensemen though."

If Kerr is lucky, maybe he can land a few more transfer students from Wilton.

"I'd love that," laughed Kerr. "Preferably some big kids, about 6-4, with speed."

# C-C takes a tumble

## Longmeadow rules as undisputed king

Mass. champion Longmeadow marched to Concord yesterday and made it clear it is the undisputed king of Massachusetts lacrosse.

Paced by the play of Mike Murphy (3 goals, 2 assists) and Chris Martinelli (2 goals, 5 assists), Longmeadow won its second straight state title, slapping a 14-7 loss on previously unbeaten Concord-Carlisle.

It marked the 15th time in the 21-year tournament that Longmeadow has won the title.

Longmeadow (15-6) jumped on C-C early, grabbing a 5-0 lead after the first quarter and an 8-1 advantage at the half.

"We came out ready to play our game, but they really shocked us," said C-C junior attackman Brad Glowaki. "We let them have the ball too much. When we gave it up, they rushed it at us."

John Ashe began the Longmeadow scoring onslaught at 10:49, snapping a quick wrist shot by keeper Billy Hackett (nine saves). Chad Reynolds scored the first of his two goals less than a minute later when he batted in Martinelli's shot at 9:58.

Ashe scored his second goal and Don McLaughlin and Nick Lagunewick added tallies later in the first quarter.

"I was a little nervous about getting behind, because it's been a while since we've been in that situation," said C-C coach Dick Kerr, whose club finished 21-1. "But we were just overwhelmed by some great athletes."

Things didn't improve for C-C in the second quarter. After a Glowaki goal, Longmeadow ripped off three straight, two by Murphy and one by Chris Young.

Longmeadow's lead grew to 12-2 after three periods. C-C had some great chances to get back in the game but was stonewalled by keeper Eric LeDuc (13 saves).

"Eric is a tough kid in the cage," said Longmeadow coach Dan Kane, who has won seven state crowns in his nine-year tenure. "He shut them down at the right times."

In the final period, Concord-Carlisle began to show the style of play that led it to the EMass championship.

Kerr's club scored four straight goals - two by Bobby Leland and single tallies by Wells and Glowaki - in the first four minutes to cut the deficit to 12-6.

Martinelli quieted the rally when he cut through the C-C defense and zipped a shot past Hackett. The teams traded goals late in the period.
