Rivals dominate high school lacrosse

CONCORD - There's little to choose between the two teams.

Very little.

If one isn't at the top of the heap when the season ends, the other usually is. And the team that isn't is usually right behind.

We're talking about the boys' lacrosse teams at Concord-Carlisle and Lincoln-Sudbury regional high schools.

The two have dominated the lacrosse scene in eastern Massachusetts throughout the '70s and '80s, and now, in the '90s, appear to be doing the same thing.

"We're strong, make no mistake about it," says Lincoln coach Andy Oleksi, "but right now, Concord is a bit more dominating than we are."

And, responds Concord coach Dick Kerr, "our division [West] has got to be the toughest around, and right now, we're No. 1 and Lincoln is No. 2. We both should be right up there when the season ends."

Between them, since 1974, the two teams have won 13 of 17 E.Mass titles and three state championships. Longmeadow has thwarted seven other state title bids.

The western Massachusetts power has been a constant thorn in Concord's side, especially in the '80s and last year, as it won state tournament matchups in 1980, 1983, 1984, 1988 and 1990.

"As tough as we are," said Kerr, "Longmeadow has always proven to be a bit tougher. The most frustrating loss was in 1989, in five overtimes."

Why is it that Concord-Carlisle and Lincoln-Sudbury teams excel?

Kerr cites two reasons.

"First," he says, "when we started talking lacrosse seriously, Jim McLellan, who was the coach, emphasized the basic skills, throw and catch. We'd throw and catch much better than other teams."

"And second, a team that wins plays the toughest schedule it can. We do that. We not only play in a real tough division, but we play teams from out of state and the best private schools we can."

"A team that stays in its own league, doesn't really push itself to

see [just how good it is. A strong outside schedule creates mental toughness."

Oleksi says, tongue in cheek, "I'd like to think good coaching has something to do with it."

"Seriously, though, there are several reasons. The quality of the athlete, the commitment of the school, and the mounting interest. We have about 120-130 kids coming out each season."

"We have three levels - freshman, junior varsity and varsity - and it's obvious that success breeds success. We also watch college games and try to play as tough a schedule as we can."

There's also stability.

McLellan and Kerr, 35, are the only two coaches in Concord's lacrosse history. Oleksi, 41, started the Lincoln program in 1979 and has

been associated with it most of the 21 years since.

"The years 1972-1980 were basically the formative years of high school lacrosse in this area," recalls Oleksi. "The players back then were Steve Connolly at Belerica, Jim McLellan at Concord, Tom DePeyer at Newton North, and Tony Manelli at Weymouth."

"We were fortunate in that we established ourselves early. In 1972, we played in the first state tournament at UMass. We lost to Longmeadow in the first round, but the tradition had been started."

Kerr says that McLellan started lacrosse at Concord in 1969 and that the team played in the E.Mass League along with a dozen or so established teams, including Wrentham, which has the oldest lacrosse program in the state.

"Another reason that Concord dominates is that the team normally is not satisfied with its records. It considers a good season one in which it has won it all. It has great expectations of itself."

Concord was 12-1 overall and 8-0 in the league heading down the stretch. Its only loss was to private school power Loomis Chaffee.

Key performers have been tri-captains Brad Glowacki, Keith Burgess, and Dan Wells, along with Bob Leibel and goalie Gary Bellardino.

Glowacki was among the state's leading scorers with 44 goals and 44 assists after 14 games, and Kerr says Leibel is the "fastest ever to play here." Bellardino has been solid in the net and recently against Newton North came up with 26 saves.

Lincoln, after 12 games, was 12-1

overall and 8-1 in the league. Its only loss was to, you guessed it, Concord, early in the season.

"What a rivalry," says Oleksi. "Lincoln and Concord. I mean, there's lacrosse games, and then there's Lincoln and Concord."

Lincoln, too, has tri-captains, in Ryan Jewell, Erik Norwood, and Todd Smith. Jewell has been heavily recruited and will take his lacrosse talents to Notre Dame in the fall and Norwood will prep at Choate. Smith was the team's offensive leader before suffering a season-ending knee injury early in the season. Oleksi also singles out the play of senior Matt Smith.

You can virtually be assured that when the state tournament rolls around, either Concord or Lincoln will be there at the end.

"But," says Kerr, "so likely will be Longmeadow."

It's Lincoln-Sudbury in OT

Conc.-Carlisle 8 - Some people may have believed that Lincoln-Sudbury's attempt to eliminate defending Eastern Mass. Division 1 lacrosse champion Concord-Carlisle on its home field was just a pipe dream. They were half-right.

Senior Mike Zilvitis scored with 40 seconds left to lift second-seeded Lincoln-Sudbury (17-1) past its South rival, 9-8, in overtime and win the EMass title.

"It's called a pipe play," said assistant coach Dave Burday, whose team has used the play with great success all year. "We send an attacker to the pipe and clear everyone else out."

Zilvitis sprinted down the right wing toward the near goalpost and unleashed a shot that ricocheted off the stick of keeper Gary Bellardino into the net.

"I tried it before and it didn't work," said Zilvitis, who is bound for Notre Dame next year. "I saw the opening, I shot and luckily I came out on top."

The goal came immediately after a frightening 15-minute delay caused by an injury to Concord-Carlisle defenseman Joe Thurman.

The senior was caught in the

middle of a solid body check by two Lincoln-Sudbury players. Thurman crumpled to the ground and remained there, slightly moving his head and the fingers on his right hand. He was placed in a collar and taken by stretcher into an ambulance headed for Emerson Hospital in Concord.

After various tests, including X-rays, "he was treated and released," said Nancy Hogan, a nursing supervisor at the hospital. "I'm not sure what the diagnosis was."

The incident overshadowed an extraordinary comeback by Concord-Carlisle (17-3).

Trailing, 6-1, in the third period, midfielder Bobby Leland began the rally, stealing the ball and feeding tricaptain Dan Wells, who beat Globe Player of the Year Ryan Jewell. Derek Rizzo then both scored and assisted in a two-minute span, passing to Brad Glowaki on the second goal to shave Lincoln-Sudbury's lead to 6-4 after three periods.

Concord-Carlisle midfielder Rich Eckel charged in from the left wing and scored 1:23 into the fourth period, and Wells added the equalizer 17 seconds later on a centering pass from Eckel.

The teams then matched goals, with Lincoln-Sudbury briefly pulling ahead on Jeff Theiler's bouncer with 8:30 left and Glowaki countering

with a backhand for top-seeded Concord-Carlisle four minutes later.

Concord-Carlisle seemed poised for the victory when it took its first lead, 8-7, as Rizzo wheeled around from behind the net and fired the ball past Jewell's left leg. But Lincoln-Sudbury's Tyrone Croom took advantage of his opponents' momentary lapse of concentration and potted a goal only six seconds later by charging downfield and faking out a defender with a spin move.

Lincoln-Sudbury took its early advantage on three goals by Kevin Dolan.

Pats prove worth Defeat Conn. powerhouse

CONCORD — The Concord-Carlisle High boys' lacrosse team flexed its muscles again yesterday, pinning a 15-9 defeat on visiting Darien High of Connecticut in an inter-state battle of public school powerhouses.

LACROSSE

C-C is a perennial state title challenger in Massachusetts, while previously-undefeated Darien entered as the No. 2-ranked team in Connecticut this spring.

The victory upped the Patriots' record to 4-1 overall, while Darien left with a 6-1 mark.

"We had several chances to really break it open," said C-C Coach Dick Kerr. "But every time we threatened to pull away we'd let up a little, and Darien would climb back into contention. It was still a very good win for us. We did a lot of things right."

Senior attack Brad Glowaki remained on a personal rampage, netting five goals and assisting on two others. In five games this season Glowaki has 18 goals, 18 assists for 36 points. He still has a long way to go to surpass Concord's single-season school record of 136 points established by current UMass-Amherst standout Mike Cain.

Rick Eckel contributed four goals against Darien, Bob Leland had two goals, three assists, Derek Rizzo two goals and Dan Wells one goal, one assist.

Senior goaltender Gary Bellardino made 15 saves, and Keith Burgess played a strong defensive game for C-C.

The Patriots led 3-1 after one period, 6-3 at halftime and 11-6 after three quarters.

Concord-Carlisle hits the road for New York this weekend, playing at Mahopac High Friday night (7:30 p.m.). Saturday the Pats have a game scrimmage against Yorktown, N.Y., one of the best interscholastic teams in the Empire State this year.

The next Eastern Mass. League game will be Tuesday at Newton South (4 p.m.).

Win some, lose some

Concord falls in lacrosse

CONCORD — Senior attackman Mike Zilzitis scored with 35 seconds remaining in overtime to lift Lincoln-Sudbury over defending champ Concord-Carlisle, 9-8, yesterday in the Eastern Mass. boys' lacrosse championship game.

Zilzitis scored the sudden-death game-winner for the Warriors with a shot into the upper corner past Concord-Carlisle goalie Gary Bellardino.

Lincoln-Sudbury (17-1) advanced to the state championship game against defending state champ Longmeadow on Saturday. Concord-Carlisle finished the season at 17-2 overall, as both losses came against Lincoln-Sudbury.

The Warriors tied the game at 8-8 with four minutes to play on midfielder Tyrone Croom's goal.

Lincoln-Sudbury's standout goalie Ryan Jewell shut out the Patriots for the final minutes of regulation and through the 3-minute overtime session until Zilzitis scored.

Lincoln-Sudbury burst ahead 4-0 and was ahead 5-1 at halftime. Jesse Sackert had the only first-half goal for Concord-Carlisle.

The lead grew to 6-1 early in the second half, before the Patriots rallied with five straight goals. Dan Wells' goal started the Concord-Carlisle comeback, and after

goals by Derek Rizzo, Brad Glowaki and Rich Eckel, Wells scored again to tie the score at 6-6.

Lincoln-Sudbury went back ahead 7-6, but back-to-back goals by Glowaki and Rizzo gave Concord-Carlisle its only lead at 8-7.

Lincoln-Sudbury relied on a tough defense, Jewell's netminding and four goals by Kevin Dolan to reach state championship game.

The two teams split their regular-season games, but Lincoln-Sudbury had the post-season edge.

High-flying Brad Glowaki is C-C's 'Mr. Excitement'

CONCORD — Hardly any of Brad Glowaki's moves are pre-conceived.

Concord-Carlisle's high-scoring attackman usually creates as he goes along. Glowaki takes what the defense gives him and acts on the spur of the moment.

Thus far, Glowaki's impulsive approach to lacrosse has paid big dividends. Even though he rarely plays more than half the game, Glowaki leads Eastern Mass. in scoring with 49 goals and 104 points and is one of the main reasons the Patriots (14-1) are ranked first in the latest Coaches' Poll.

"Most of the time I freewheel (during a game)," said Glowaki. "I act on impulse and look for the open man. But I can't get too carried away. I can freewheel, but I have to freewheel under a set of rules."

"A lot of it is anticipation. I've got to know what the defense is trying to do and stay a step ahead of them. Once I've accomplished that, I've got the upper hand."

More often than not, Glowaki

Glowaki 'pound for pound' is the best

In 13-8, 1990 has had the upper hand this spring. The senior sniper has an outside shot of breaking C-C's single-season point total record of 144, set by former Sun Player-of-the-Year Mike Cain in 1988.

"He's extremely quick," said C-C veteran coach Dick Kerr. "He does a great job changing direction. He may not be the most dominant player in Eastern Massachusetts, but he's probably the best player pound-for-pound."

Two years ago, the "best" lacrosse player in EMass. was one of the top outfielders in Connecticut.

Glowaki moved to Concord from Wilton, Conn., after his sophomore year. Since Wilton is a lacrosse hot-bed, Kerr figured Glowaki would be well-served in the sport. He figured wrong.

"When I heard an athlete moved into town from Wilton I was all excited," said Kerr. "I thought I was getting a lacrosse player. Instead, I got a centerfielder."

Kerr watched Glowaki play lacrosse in gym class and talked him into going out for the team.

It didn't take Glowaki long to adapt to catching balls with a lacrosse stick instead of snagging them with a glove. He had a team-high 87 points last year as C-C advanced to the state final.

"I sort of sensed he'd pick it up quick," said Kerr. "He had the skills. It was just a matter of learning techniques. Once he decided to become a lacrosse player, he committed himself to the game."

Glowaki has been at his best in the big games. He led the Patriots in scoring during the tournament last spring. Earlier this season, Glowaki had

eight points in the Patriots' win over third-ranked Weymouth and six goals in C-C's victory over sixth-ranked Newton South.

He hopes to deliver in the clutch again tonight when C-C plays at second-ranked Lincoln-Sudbury (7-9), in a game that will determine the West Division championship. The Patriots, who've already earned a share of the division crown, beat L-S 13-10 in their first meeting.

"I'm really looking forward to this game," said Glowaki. "It's the biggest game I've played in since the state final. We don't want to share the title with them. We want to win it outright."

Teams have tried to slow Glowaki down by shadowing him. But this tactic hasn't worked.

Glowaki is hard to defend since he thinks pass first and shot second. He usually sets up shop behind the opponent's net — a la Craig Janney — and waits for his teammates to break free out front.

"John Fay is probably the best player we've had here," said Kerr, who has coached in the Patriots' system for 17 years. "Mike Cain was probably the most valuable since he made everyone around him a better player. Brad is one of our most exciting players. He definitely runs up there with the best players we've had here."

Glowaki plans on attending the University of Delaware. But before he heads off to college he'd love to help C-C win a state title.

"Individual honors are nice, but unless we win the state title I'll always feel like I only did a halfway job," said Glowaki.

Concord-Carlisle cruises, 16-6

Concord-Carlisle entered last night's game with Newton South a bit concerned, although it had beaten its Dual County League rival twice during the season.

In the first meeting, Concord-Carlisle beat Newton South handily, 16-7. The second meeting was

a little different. Concord won only 11-7 and was "totally outplayed in that game," according to coach Dick Kerr. In fact, Newton South was leading, 6-5, in the third quarter.

"That game helped us a little tonight," said Kerr. "If we had beaten them easily twice, it's harder to get the kids up. But that gave us some respect for Newton South."

But this was the EMass semifinal. This was Concord's territory, and Newton South was not going to stop the defending EMass champ as Concord (17-2) rolled, 16-6.

"I felt confident coming in," said Kerr. "I told the kids that this was the time to really play. The ball only came down [into Concord territory] twice for a short time in the first 12 minutes. We came to play."

Danny Wells had five points (four goals, one assist), while Brad Glowaki and Rich Eckel added a pair of goals and two assists. Jon Smith had the hat trick.

In the 11-7 win, netminder Gary Bellardino had to make 26 saves. This time he only had to make eight.

"I think we are playing pretty close to our potential," said Kerr. "We played under the lights in New York earlier and beat Mahopac, 7-0. That was the best we've played. The zero says a lot. But right now we are getting closer to our potential."

Another in a long line of outstanding Concord-Carlisle lacrosse players, Glowaki earned All-America honors this spring as the state's most versatile attackman.

An outstanding athlete who also captained C-C's football team, the senior's greatest lacrosse attribute, according to C-C coach Dick Kerr, is his feel for the game.

"He's both a good feeder and a good scorer," Kerr said about Glowaki, whose 53 goals and 60 assists in 17 regular-season games led the state.

Glowaki has been a two-year starter at Concord, since transferring from Wilton (Conn.) High, a perennially nationally-ranked lacrosse school. He is headed for the University of Delaware, where he will play lacrosse and major in physical therapy.

Leland has outstanding stick skills with either hand, is a crafty dodger, has an outstanding shot, and is a tough faceoff man. He tallied 40 points this spring, his first as a starter.
