Concord continues its mastery of Colonials

Greer netted the winning goal with 2:30 left as Concord-Carlisle rallied to edge Acton-Boxboro, 10-9, and Austin Prep broke into the win column with a 3-2 victory over Masconomet Regional in local boys' lacrosse action yesterday.

The Colonials haven't beaten Concord-Carlisle since 1985 when current A-B coach Steve Colby was a player.

They came within an eyelash yesterday, leading 2-1, 5-4 and 8-7 at the first three quarter breaks. But the Patriots rallied in the final stanza, with Peter Greer's lone goal of the game enabling C-C to improve to 2-1 league and 2-2 overall.

Junior attackman Gordon Allen scored five goals for Concord, while junior midfielder Jason Fivek netted one goal and passed out five assists.

Senior attack Rick Eckel, senior midfielder Jesse Fackert and Ryan Sandel contributed one goal and one assist each.

Senior attackman Mike Collmer countered with three goals for Acton-Boxboro. Senior midfielder A.J. Pittorino added two goals and two assists, and junior attack Matt Close had two goals, one assist and senior middie Ryan Hayes one goal, three assists.

 Junior Alex Nephew pocketed one goal and senior Mike Keenan had an assist.

The Patriots finished with a 20-16 shooting edge, goalie Jason Newcomb making seven saves for C-C and junior Mike Smith 10 for A-B.

The Colonials continue a brutal week by hosting Lincoln-Sudbury tomorrow (4 p.m.) and Billerica on Saturday (10 a.m.).

tail under all circumstances earned Newton North its first state final berth since 1989.

Chris Claflin scored four goals to back the superb goaltending of Brett Splain as Newton North routed Concord-Carlisle, 10-3, in the Eastern Mass. final yesterday.

Newton North (18-1) will host Longmeadow, a 17-2 winner over Amherst yesterday, in the state final Saturday at 1 p.m.

"It just came down to having our heads in the game," said midfielder Chris Mensoian, who contributed two goals and an assist.

Concord-Carlisle (11-4) could not duplicate the performance it gave in a quarterfinal upset of top-seeded Lincoln-Sudbury. The team missed midfielder Ben Chaset, who suffered a deep back bruise against Billerica Friday. The junior watched from a wheelchair as his team lost in the state semifinals for the second straight year.

Newton North took a 1-0 lead 2:14 into the game. After Concord-Carlisle was flagged for unnecessary roughness, senior Brian Salmanson scored on a bouncer past goalie Jason Newcomb.

Newton North increased its lead to 4-1 on goals by Claflin, Toby Rand and Salmanson, sandwiched around a score by Concord-Carlisle's Rowen Sandel.

C-C turns the tables

Concord-Carlisle's boys' lacrosse coach Dick Kerr knew he had the odds on his side when his squad began its EMass tournament quarterfinal matchup with unbeaten Lincoln-Sudbury.

The tournament's No. 1 seed had beaten Kerr's team twice in the regular season, but both times by the slimmest of margins – 14-13 in overtime and 8-7. So, Kerr recited that old trusty sports saying to his players – it's difficult to beat the same team three times in one year.

Kerr's boys responded with their best effort of the season, upending Lincoln-Sudbury, 11-8, to advance to the semifinals. Attacker Rich Eckel scored two goals and added four assists, and middle Jason Fivek notched the hat trick, adding two assists.

But Kerr thought the game was won by defensemen Mike Leonard and Josh Schohn, who held Lincoln-Sudbury's pair of 50-goal scorers, Kevin Dolan and Brendan Glass, to only a goal apiece.

RICK ECKEL Concord-Carlisle

Eckel, a senior attackman, was the primary reason Concord-Carlisle upset rival Lincoln-Sudbury in the tournament, scoring two goals and adding four assists.

He finished the season with 28 goals and 42 assists and was named an All-Scholastic. As a junior, Eckel scored 18 goals and added 27 assists.

The 5-foot-9, 150-pound senior will enter St. Lawrence University in the fall.



JESSE FACKERT Concord-Carlisle

Fackert, a senior midfielder, scored 30 goals and added 15 assists in only 15 games this season. He possessed perhaps the fastest shot in Eastern Mass., to go along with his quick feet.

"Toward the end of the season, we gave him the green light to shoot, shoot, shoot," said Concord coach Dick Kerr.

Fackert, who is also a soccer standout, was named a first-team West League All-Star in his first season as a starter for the Patriots.

He will enter the College of Wooster (Ohio) this fall.



JASON FIVEK Concord-Carlisle

Fivek, a midfielder, was the best allaround player on a Concord-Carlisle team that advanced to the Eastern Mass. title game before losing to Newton North. The Patriots' Golden Rule on offense was that the ball had to at some point touch Fivek's stick.

Fivek was Concord's primary faceoff man, played both man-up and man-down situations, and was the Patriots' best passing midfielder.

The junior finished with 23 goals and 16 assists and was selected a first-team Wes League All-Star and second-team All

"He's a thoroughbred," said opposing coach Steve Connolly of Billerica. "He's just the epitome of what a lacrosse player should be."



MIKE LEONARD PLAYER OF THE YEAR Concord-Carlisle

As a first-year starter on defense for perennial power Concord-Carlisle, Leonard stepped in and became an All-Scholastic while also receiving All-America consideration.

He's a very athletic defenseman," said Concord coach Dick Kerr. "Just because of his good speed, he's very hard to get by."

In Concord's 11-8 upset of defending state champion Lincoln-Sudbury in the Eastern Mass. quarterfinals, Leonard helped limit Lincoln-Sudbury's top two attackmen to only one goal each.

Leonard was also captain of the Concord-Carlisle wrestling team. He is a National Honor Society student and will attend Lehigh.
